MASTER OF ART IN TEACHING (MAT)

The Master of Arts in Teaching is a full-time, 36-credit Master's program that prepares graduates to earn an initial teaching license in Massachusetts while also providing the Master's level coursework required for a professional teaching license. This is the optimal program for students who have an active studio practice and want to teach in diverse PK-12 educational contexts. Students usually complete the full-time 36-credit MAT program in four semesters, with nine credits per semester (fall, spring, summer, and a second fall). After three years of teaching on the initial license, graduates may apply for a Massachusetts professional teaching license without further coursework.

MASTER OF EDUCATION (MEd)

The Master of Education is a 30-credit, low residency program* that integrates studio practice, pedagogy, and research. This program is designed for working teachers who aim to develop a deeper understanding of the contemporary fields of art and teaching, reinvigorate their studio practice, and learn to interpret and conduct research in art education. The MEd program qualifies students who already hold an initial teaching license to apply for a Massachusetts professional teaching license. The degree also serves as preparation for students who plan to seek a doctoral degree in art education in the future, and applicants with such goals who are not licensed or seeking licensure are welcome to apply.

The MEd balances three types of courses: studio, research, and pedagogical contexts. During the program, students investigate their own studio practice and become familiar with historical and contemporary issues in art education. Throughout the program, an emphasis is placed on social justice and equity.

TEACHER PREPARATION PROGRAM (TPP)

The **Teacher Preparation Program** is a part-time, 24 undergraduate-credit, post-baccalaureate certificate program. It is intended for students who hold a Master's degree in art or education, have an active studio practice, and who seek initial licensure as PK-12 art teachers. TPP coursework focuses on pedagogical theory and pre-practicum and practicum fieldwork experiences. Students usually complete the program in three semesters. Graduates who have entered the program with a Master's in art or education may, after three years of teaching on the initial teaching license, apply for a Massachusetts professional teaching license without further coursework.

Students who will finish their 120 credits in the fall must apply by the September deadline. Students who will finish the 120 credits in the spring must apply by the January deadline. The MA program begins in the summer that immediately follows their 120-credit BFA graduation. If accepted, students graduate at the end of the following spring term with 120 credits. They complete the required 6-credit student teaching practicum during the MA program, in lieu of durin the BFA program, to qualify for initial licensure in Massachusetts. International students are not eligible for this program.

BFA/MAT [4+1 PROGRAMS]

Students who pursue an undergraduate degree in other studio majors or Art History do so because they want to begin their studies by exploring a particular studio or scholarly process in depth, before focusing on learning to teach art.*
